The petition to prevent Donald Trump making a State Visit to the UK has now got over a million signatures. Some say that the petition is partially due to the President's executive order banning travel to the US from certain Muslim majority countries. ## CFS IS CELEBRATING WORLD PI DAY

Pi Day is celebrated on **March 14th (3/14)** around the world. Pi (Greek letter " $\pi$ ") is the symbol used in mathematics to represent a constant — the ratio of the circumference of a circle to its diameter — which is approximately 3.14159.

Pi has been calculated to over **one trillion** digits beyond its decimal point. As an irrational and transcendental number, it will continue infinitely without repetition or pattern.

While only a handful of digits are needed for typical calculations, Pi's infinite nature makes it a fun challenge to memorize, and to computationally calculate more and more digits.
